# Research and Training

Scottish Rite Hospital was the first pediatric hospital in the United States to employ full-time hand surgeons. Through quality patient care, education and research, the hospital's hand experts have paved the way in treating patients with the common to the complex of upper limb conditions.

The A.C. and Eleanor M. Garison Fellowship in Hand and Upper Limb Treatment was established in 2013 to implement specialized training for the next generation of hand surgeons. As one of only five pediatric orthopedic hospitals in the country to offer a program of this caliber, the expertise of our hand surgeons extends to those nationally and internationally.

The Center for Excellence in Hand conducts ongoing research to better understand the complexities of each condition. Through the different studies, our team is able to analyze a hand condition as a whole and determine the most effective form of treatment.
