


AT SCOTTISH RITE HOSPITAL, GIVING ISN'T JUST ABOUT

collaboration is at the heart of providing world-renowned patient care. As a premier medical institution, nationally and internationally, we are privileged to work alongside several worldclass health systems.

We recently partnered with UT Southwestern Medical

Center's department of Orthopedic Surgery to host the Perry Initiative – a group established in 2009 to inspire young women to become leaders in the engineering and orthopedic surgery fields. Both institutions featured presentations from highly respected female surgeons,

physicians and researchers to provide guidance, education and inspiration to female high school and medical school students.

In December, the hospital hosted the eighth annual Clinical Research Conference. This meeting brings together research professionals from Scottish Rite Hospital, Children's Health, UT Southwestern

and Parkland Memorial Hospital to harness collaboration within the research community. Each year, this conference educates, informs and creates awareness about how research enhances patient care in the Dallas area.

As we continue to collaborate locally, we also have ongoing opportunities to do so globally. Scottish Rite Hospital hosted the sixth annual International Perthes Study Group meeting in October. As the lead site of this multi-center research study, the hospital works with more than 45 pediatric orthopedic surgeons and researchers from around the world to advance the knowledge and treatment of Perthes disease. Because this pediatric hip condition is quite rare, it requires a team with different backgrounds to cultivate fresh ideas for new research. As an institution, we are proud to be the leader of this prestigious group.

Our mission to educate, conduct research and provide world-renowned patient care is made possible through our commitment to collaboration and improving the lives of children with orthopedic conditions.

A Stitch in Time

The group known today as the Scottish Rite Hospital Sewing Volunteers dates back to March of 1921, months prior to the hospital receiving its official charter in October of that year. A report from 1939 recognized these generous seamstresses for mending more than 2.000 garments, sewing 640 patient gowns and purchasing other linen necessities. Today, the sewing volunteers carry on a rich, 97-year tradition of donating their time and talents to the patients of Scottish Rite Hospital. We are one of the only hospitals in the country to have this unique program.

Spine Team Selected for Best Paper Award at Annual Meeting

RECENTLY, STAFF FROM THE HOSPITAL ATTENDED


the 11th annual International Congress on Early Onset Scoliosis meeting. Research from the hospital titled, "Continued deterioration in pulmonary function at minimum 18-year follow-up from early thoracic function in non-neuromuscular scoliosis" was selected from eight nominated projects for the Behrooz Akbarnia, M.D., Best Paper award.

This long-term, follow-up study analyzed if there was a continued decline in respiratory function in patients who had undergone a thoracic spinal fusion for early onset scoliosis before the age of 9 years old. The team's research showed that children who received a spinal fusion at a young age have a continued decline in their lung function as they enter adulthood.

Assistant Chief of Staff Lori A. Karol, M.D., was a key contributor to this research. "As an institution, we see the importance of researching this patient population to help define how spinal surgery impacts respiratory function," Karol explains. "From this project, we can look into the future and determine innovative treatments that may allow for better pulmonary (lung related) growth in young children with scoliosis."

The hospital's research continues to discover new ways to treat children with orthopedic conditions to deliver outstanding care to our patients and children everywhere.




IT'S LIKELY THAT ONE OF

the first things you do each morning is stretch. The act of stretching helps awaken the body and sends a message to your muscles, joints and bones that it's time to get moving. "We are excited to inform a large audience of people throughout this region and beyond about the services and expertise we have available," Sucato says.

The brand campaign the hospital is launching this spring will do precisely that through a combination of television, print, digital, radio and outdoor media. Another point shared in this messaging is the hospital's expertise in the pediatric area of orthopedics.

"Unlike an adult, the treatment approach can have long-term effects in children and adolescents as they mature," explains Philip L. Wilson, M.D., assistant chief of staff and director of the Center for Excellence in Sports Medicine. "That's why it's so important for kids to receive expert care that's tailored to their musculoskeletal development."

Three of our patients will represent the hospital's services in the new brand campaign, "Move Freely." Olivia, age 12, of Grapevine, is an aspiring ballerina whose future performances were in jeopardy, due to scoliosis. Thanks to a non-invasive, physical-therapy-based treatment approach, she is back on stage and right *en pointe*.

Sports medicine patient and competitive soccer player, Zachary, age 9, of Allen, was enjoying his favorite pastime when he injured his right knee. After surgery, recovery and physical rehabilitation, he is once again on the field and back in the game.

And finally, Marlee, age 5, of Dallas, went through two surgeries and two rounds of casting to temporarily immobilize her lower body, a treatment for hip dysplasia. Today, she is a body in constant motion, especially on the playground.

The iconic crayon in the hospital's logo also plays a role in the campaign. It creates colorful, continuous line drawings that complement each patient's journey.

"When we create a greater awareness about our expertise and the services we provide, it creates a ripple effect," Sucato says. "For example, we travel nationally and internationally to share our research and collaborate with other institutions. We educate future orthopedic surgeons through our fellowship program. All of these things improve the standard of care for children with orthopedic conditions, locally and around the world."

Whether a child's dream is to take the stage, take the field or simply take a trip to the playground, Scottish Rite Hospital is there every step of the way. We're world-renowned experts in treating muscles, joints and bones for a reason. Because when we keep moving our field forward, kids are free to do the things that move them. \bigcirc

Bert V. Massey, II

Member of the Scottish Rite Hospital Board of Trustees Since 2016

TRUSTEE BERT V. MASSEY, II has made his mark on Brownwood, Texas, but this native son would tell you the opposite is true. As a teen finding his way, he joined a Masonic-affiliated, leadership organization called the Order of DeMolay. It was there he developed a passion for community service, self-confidence and leadership skills. After high school, he earned both his undergraduate and law degrees from the University of Texas at Austin. Massey eventually returned home, where he continues to practice real estate law and write title insurance. In 1984, the once shy, hometown boy became Brownwood's mayor, a role he held for 26 years. Today, he contributes his love of service to Scottish Rite Hospital patients, so that they, too, can make their mark someday.

TEAM LEADER

Massey was a member of the Brownwood city council for six years before becoming mayor. "We did some good things for the city," he says of the council. "I avoid saying, 'I did this' and 'I did that' because it was a team effort. We did it together."

MASONIC MENTORS

Inspired by his Masonic advisors in the Order of DeMolay youth organization, Massey became a Mason at age 21. "Masonry reinforces life lessons, you become a brother and friend and it's so charitably minded," he says. Massey's father died when he was 7 years old. He remained lifelong friends with his Masonic mentor, the late W. J. "Jack" Gordon, and wears Gordon's 33rd degree pin on his lapel. "When speaking to others, he often referred to me as his son," Massey says.

CIVIC DUTY

In addition to his mayoral and Masonic commitments, Massey has dedicated his time to a long list of civic boards and committees. "I don't think it's enough to just take your living out of a community and stack it up in a bank," he says. "We should all give something back. Places like the hospital wouldn't exist without that kind of support." He attributes his civic commitment to his mother, the Order of DeMolay and Masonry.

HONORED TO SERVE

"I was honored that my friend Lyndon L. Olson, Jr. (Scottish Rite Hospital board chairman) asked me if I was willing to serve on the hospital's board of trustees," Massey says. "The hospital is filled with people who care deeply for the patients. The dedication of the staff and the board makes it such a special place."

CAMPAIGNING FOR A BRIGHT FUTURE

"It is my hope that the hospital and its new facility in Frisco will continue to provide outstanding care to children for years to come," Massey says. "It's such a bright place. I believe its future is, too."
