Recently, the hospital hosted the Academic Network of Conservational Hip Outcomes Research study group – an organization dedicated to improving the standard of care for adolescent patients diagnosed with various hip conditions.

This annual meeting provides an opportunity for members to review data and collaborate on groundbreaking projects.

Last November, our spine team traveled to Lisbon,
Portugal, for the 12th International Congress on Early Onset
Scoliosis (ICEOS) meeting. **Several members of the hospital's orthopedic team hold leadership positions within ICEOS.**

During the gathering, Scottish Rite Hospital staff led numerous discussions and presentations, exploring the latest techniques in caring for patients with this pediatric spine condition.



Punaro Receives Distinguished Clinician Scholar Award

THE RHEUMATOLOGY CLINIC AT SCOTTISH RITE HOSPITAL is

highly recognized as one of the nation's premier pediatric rheumatic centers. During the annual meeting of the American College of Rheumatology (ACR) in Chicago, Ill., last fall, Scottish Rite Hospital's Marilynn G. Punaro, M.D., medical director of Rheumatology, was presented

with the 2018 Distinguished Clinician Scholar Award.

IT TAKES A LOT OF COURAGE TO BARE YOUR HEART

ON STAGE, which is something patient Madie, age 17, does regularly with an enthusiasm that makes people smile. She has spent the past three years performing Broadway-style musicals at a community theater near her hometown of Keller. However, she has been singing and dancing since she could walk – the latter being something her mom and dad thought she would never do.

Madie was born with bilateral clubfeet, a congenital foot abnormality that causes both feet to turn inward. Her parents were told she would never walk. Little did they know that one day, she would be dancing and turning cartwheels in more than 15 musical productions to date.

"You take for granted how far she's come and how she's gotten here," Madie's dad, Jason, says. "You're proud of your kids no matter what. But to see her doing something she loves, when you didn't think she could do *anything* like that — it's what you live for."

Madie's pediatrician referred her family to Scottish Rite Hospital when she was only 3 weeks old. She received clubfoot treatment from a team of experts representing the hospital's Center for Excellence in Foot. Her parents met with pediatric orthopedic surgeon and hospital Chief of Staff Daniel J. Sucato, M.D., M.S., and agreed on a treatment plan involving a series of casts on their daughter's feet.

After casting and hours of physical therapy at the hospital, the condition was corrected in Madie's right foot. Her left foot required surgery but by age 2, she was fully recovered. The treatment of each foot was a success.

Madie's parents remember how proud she was to wear her first pair of shoes and how thankful they were to the care team who helped her along the way. "You come to Scottish Rite for the first time and your child is so little. You don't have a lot of perspective," Madie's mom, Jennifer, says. "But it doesn't take long to figure out that this hospital is the place you want to be. These people are the best at what they do."

Sucato and his team continued to follow Madie's progress throughout her childhood. She experienced no complications from her clubfoot diagnosis. However, at the age of 10, she began experiencing hip pain.

Madie returned to Scottish Rite Hospital where it was discovered she had a hip condition called femoroacetabular impingement. This occurs when the femur impinges against the socket as it flexes, which causes hip pain.

She learned surgery would be necessary to correct the issue but she wasn't worried. "The hospital is like a second home to me. I remember being excited to go there when I was little," Madie says. "All the people there have had a huge impact on my life."

Madie's hospital journey is an example of our team approach to care. For her clubfoot treatment, she was seen by Sucato and his team, radiologists and physical therapists. She then entered a new chapter of care with our Center for Excellence in Hip.

Pediatric orthopedic surgeon Henry B. Ellis, M.D., is a specialist in hip conditions as well as sports medicine. His areas of expertise were an excellent complement for treating an active patient like Madie. Ellis and Sucato worked side-by-side to perform Madie's successful hip surgery. A short while later, Madie was back to performing on stage.

"It's fairly rare that we see a child for two different orthopedic conditions," Sucato explains. "Here's a young girl who had two surgeries and while taking it all in stride, has gone on to develop a great talent."

Madie says she will never forget her second surgery date because two years later to the day, she was singing and dancing in a production of *Bye Bye Birdie*.

"Her parents were really good about always telling her, 'You can do anything,' " says John Wilkerson, director of Artisan Center Theater in Hurst. "So she *does* try to do anything and she's usually pretty successful at it."

One of Madie's latest accomplishments includes being nominated for the 2018 Chita Rivera Dance Award – an honor given by a DFW-based nonprofit organization called The Column Awards.

"My favorite part of performing is taking the audience away from whatever might be going on in their lives and telling a story, so they can live in the character just as I do," Madie says.

She plans to go to college to study musical theater and use her knowledge to inspire other young artists someday. "I think my biggest dream for the future is to teach other teenagers what I've learned in my time of being a performer," Madie explains. "My directors, dance teachers and voice instructors are some of the most valuable people in my life. I would love to be that person for somebody else."

In addition to being a patient, Madie is also a hospital supporter. For the past five years, she has conducted an annual teddy bear drive for the hospital during the holidays. She also sings her favorite holiday songs for patients during her bear donation visit, while her dad accompanies her on the guitar (as pictured on the front cover).

"Scottish Rite Hospital helped Madie get back on her feet, but she has done all the hard work to become who she is today," Sucato says.

Madie is grateful for the care she has received throughout her healing journey, despite the obstacles along the way. "Dancing has always been a huge dream of mine and I never thought it would become a reality," Madie says. "I'm very thankful and I wouldn't do it any other way."

MASONIC MENTOR

A dear friend, legal colleague and fellow church member of Smith's was a hospital board member, the late Vester T. Hughes, Jr. "I told Vester I wanted to get involved in the hospital and he asked me, 'How involved do you want to be?' " Then Smith followed Hughes' example and became a Mason, which has been an enriching experience that also prepared him to serve on the hospital's board.

TIME AND TALENT

This talented artist creates watercolor paintings and handmade cards in his spare time. Smith also uses his legal and financial expertise to help create bright futures for hospital patients. "To be able to use my time, talents and experience to serve the hospital for all that it does for children is a blessing," Smith says.

Patient's Attitude is a Win for Everybody

IN MANY WAYS, OWEN IS A TYPICAL 9-YEAR-OLD. He enjoys time with his best friend and he loves playing video games. Loves it. He also has more than 15,000 YouTube followers, a starring television commercial role and has undergone 33 surgeries related to a rare, congenital genetic disorder. However, even for those of us who aren't TV stars, Owen believes we're all more alike than we are different.

Owen was born with Escobar Syndrome, which is accompanied by arthrogryposis (tight joints, tendons and muscles), pterygium (excess skin webbing on joints) and

kyphoscoliosis (a spine that curves side to side and front to back). He was referred to Scottish Rite Hospital when he was just a few weeks old.

"He was born an adorable, tight little baby," his mother, Erica, says. "Many times, parents are nervous but Scottish Rite Hospital makes each visit a positive experience."

Through the years, his treatment has involved a lot of time at the hospital and a lot of waiting - waiting to grow, waiting to heal and waiting for physical strength to return for the next spinal surgery.

"I've watched Owen grow from a baby to a delightful, intelligent and humorous boy," says Owen's orthopedist and Assistant Chief of Staff, Lori A. Karol, M.D. "He is known here by his first name alone, like everyone knows Dirk Nowitzki as 'Dirk.' Owen is that way for me."

He is now on a first-name basis with a lot of people, since starring in Microsoft commercials with his best friend, Gunnar. The spots feature

under the theme, "When everybody plays, we all win."

"Everything that I've been through has taught me that nobody is truly different," Owen says. "Even if they look different on the outside, on the inside they are the exact same as you." O
