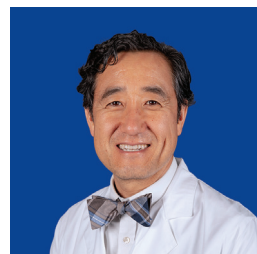

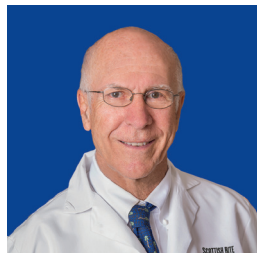

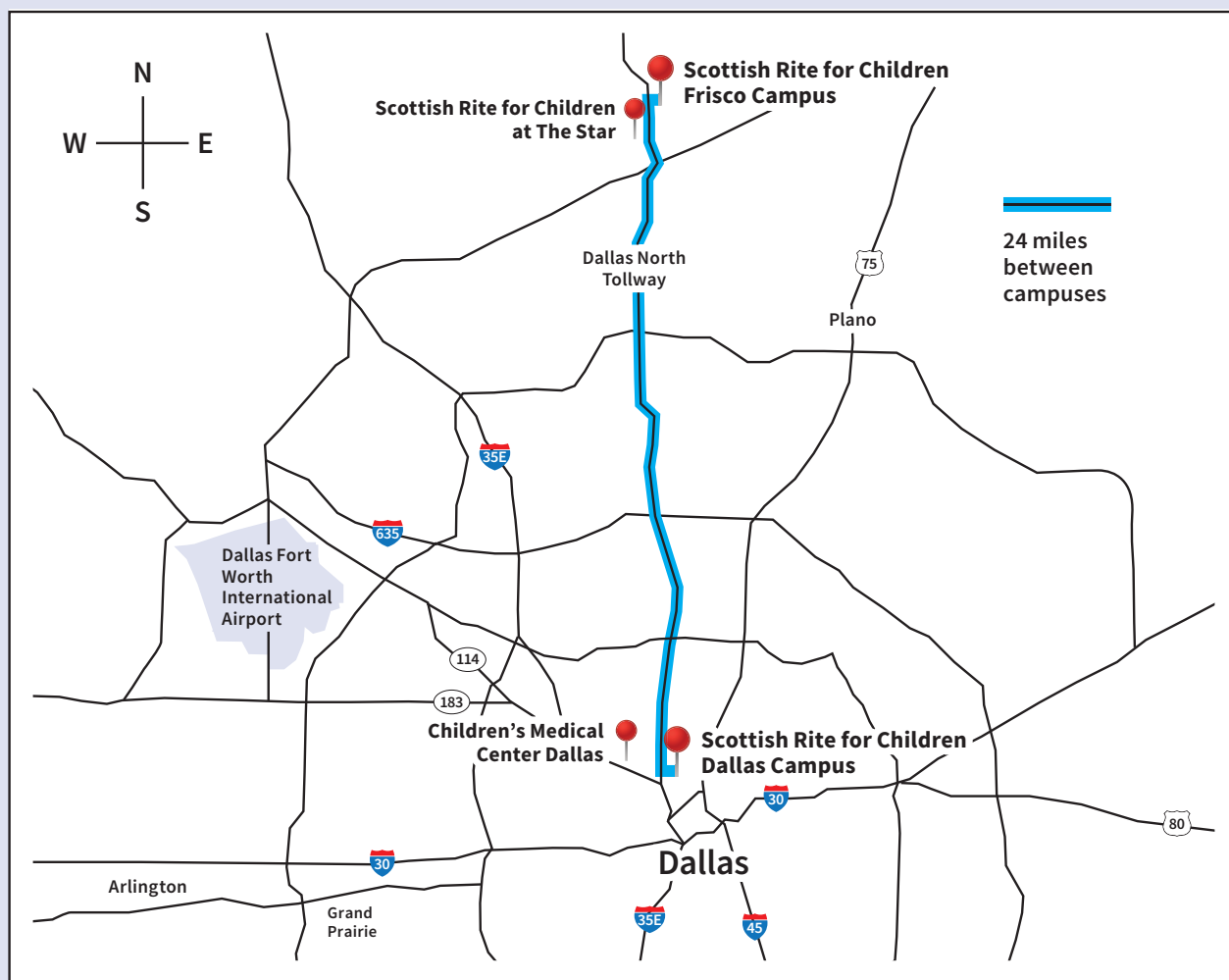

Rotations

Fellowship rotations at Scottish Rite for Children are team-based, pairing a resident and fellow together to allow the fellow to choose their clinical experience. Fellows are also provided four months of elective time at the end of the academic year to further focus their pediatric orthopedic education. This concentrated time and flexibility gives fellows the opportunity to fulfill their educational needs and better prepare for the specific clinical responsibilities of their future careers.

Surgical Experience

The surgical experience at Scottish Rite for Children encompasses numerous cases with a significant variety of pathology and a wide spectrum of complexity, from the straightforward to the very challenging and rare. Fellows play an integral role in all aspects of surgery, including preoperative evaluations, postoperative treatment and follow-up care.

A STATE-OF-THE-ART SURGICAL SUITE & OPERATING ROOMS

The Dallas campus is home to a beautifully renovated 42,000-square-foot surgical suite that includes six operating rooms with state-of-the-art equipment and technology with the ability to photograph and record surgical procedures at the touch of a button. The Frisco campus functions as an ambulatory surgery center and is home to three operating rooms.

Didactic Conferences

Fellows participate in weekly didactic conferences that offer an extensive array of specialized sessions, which are designed to deepen their knowledge and foster collaborative learning throughout the week.

WEEKLY SCHEDULE:

Monday morning begins with a small group teaching conference led by Drs. John G. Birch, Charles E. Johnston and J. A. “Tony” Herring. This conference reviews various conditions and clinical problems in a case-based format.
1 Hour in Dallas

The nationally known Monday night conference serves as the preoperative indications and surgical planning conference, the crown jewel of the educational program. Every surgical case for the upcoming week is presented in a group discussion format.
2 Hours in Dallas

Tuesday morning features core curriculum lectures in pediatric orthopedics, delivered by Scottish Rite

physicians that treat orthopedic and non-orthopedic conditions. Fellows present a topic of their choosing in the spring. **1 Hour Weekly in Dallas | 1 Hour Monthly in Frisco**

Wednesday morning is dedicated to trauma through a virtual conference that includes discussions on fractures and musculoskeletal infections. X-rays are shown, fracture patterns are reviewed, and surgical methods are examined. **1 Hour (Virtual)**

Thursday mornings rotate between a mortality and morbidity conference, a research update meeting and a monthly small group in-depth discussion on various pediatric orthopedic conditions led by one of the faculty

members. Throughout the year, various non-orthopedic topics will also be discussed, including finding your first job, integrating research and technology into your practice and practice management/billing.
1 Hour in Dallas

Friday morning concludes the week with a postoperative conference that provides a detailed review of the surgical cases performed throughout the week. This conference focuses on presenting the decision-making and techniques used during surgery.
1 Hour in Dallas | 2 Hours in Frisco for the Sports Medicine rotation preoperative/postoperative conference

Research Expectations & Opportunities

Fellows have access to a variety of research opportunities in all areas of orthopedics, including spine, sports medicine, hip, trauma, limb lengthening and reconstruction, and clubfoot deformity. The clinical research team assists fellows with patient recruitment, data collection and data analysis.

Fellows complete at least one full research manuscript during the year, but the opportunity to work on multiple projects is also available. Fellows have access to all research facilities at Scottish Rite, as well as basic science laboratories at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

Fellows present their findings at bi-monthly research update meetings, Scottish Rite's Annual Spine Symposium and annual Brandon Carrell Visiting Professorship. Many former fellows have presented their work at national and international societies, including the Pediatric Orthopaedic Society of North

America, the Scoliosis Research Society, the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and the international Limb Lengthening and Reconstruction Society. Results from these projects have been published in numerous, top tier journals such as *Spine*, *The Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery*, and the *Journal of Pediatric Orthopaedics*.



Educational Opportunities

Fellows receive support for educational opportunities both on and off campus. Each fellow receives a reimbursement up to a maximum of \$3,500 for necessary and reasonable expenses incurred by the fellow in attending approved educational meetings.

ANNUAL SPINE SYMPOSIUM

Each year, the Sarah M. and Charles E. Seay/Martha and Pat Beard Center for Excellence in Spine Research at Scottish Rite hosts a visiting professorship. This event allows fellows to learn from some of the world's leading experts in pediatric spine surgery, enhancing their knowledge about scoliosis and other pediatric spinal conditions.

JOURNAL CLUB

Fellows and Scottish Rite faculty attend a bimonthly journal club to review articles from peer-reviewed orthopedic journals, such as the *Journal of Orthopaedics*, *Spine Deformity* and *The Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery*. Journal club gives fellows experience with critiquing research and encourages fellows to use evidence-based practices within their specialties.

POST COURSE

The Pediatric Orthopedic Surgical Techniques Lab is a focused two-day cadaveric course designed to accelerate early-career surgeons' skills through 10 hours of hands-on training and expert-led lectures covering key procedures across all major anatomical regions.

POSNA/IPOS

Fellows can expand their knowledge of pediatric orthopedic conditions by attending annual meetings hosted by the Pediatric Orthopaedic Society of North America (POSNA). POSNA is a professional organization of more than 1,500 surgeons, physicians and allied health members dedicated to advancing musculoskeletal care for children through education, research, advocacy and more. Over the years, Scottish Rite has had four POSNA presidents. One of POSNA's key events, the International Pediatric Orthopedic Symposium (IPOS), focuses on a wide range of pediatric orthopedic conditions that a medical professional will encounter.

Social Events and Opportunities

Fellows are important members of the Scottish Rite for Children family and often form strong bonds with one another and the faculty. Fellows and their families are invited to participate in a variety of social activities throughout the year.



ROCKER B RANCH TRIP

Fellows and their families are invited to spend a weekend away from the city life of Dallas to the 173,000 acres of river country in West Texas at Rocker b Ranch. Rocker b Ranch was first known as the Bar S Ranch, which was established in 1888. Senator William Blakley purchased the ranch, renamed it and donated it to Scottish Rite in 1964. The operations of the working ranch benefit patient care at Scottish Rite.



DALLAS MARATHON

Thousands of runners come together for the BMW Dallas Marathon Festival, hosted annually in December. Since 1997, Scottish Rite for Children has been the primary beneficiary of the Dallas Marathon. Fellows are encouraged to join the tradition of healthy competition by running against Scottish Rite faculty in a relay to see which group crosses the finish line first!

Centers for Excellence

Scottish Rite for Children has six Centers for Excellence and other specialty clinics comprised of multidisciplinary teams that provide specialized patient care and conduct in-depth research.



SARAH M. AND CHARLES E. SEAY/MARTHA AND PAT BEARD CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN SPINE

Led by Daniel J. Sucato, M.D., M.S., the center focuses on developing innovative techniques for treating the straightforward to the most complex spinal conditions.



CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN FOOT

Under the direction of Anthony I. Riccio, M.D., the center facilitates extensive research into clubfoot — its cause, the effectiveness of operative and nonoperative treatments, and the study of gait patterns in clubfoot patients.



CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN HIP

Directed by Harry Kim, M.D., M.S., the center pioneers research on Legg-Calvé-Perthes disease and other hip disorders, including hip dysplasia, femoroacetabular impingement, slipped capital femoral epiphysis and more.



CHARLES E. SEAY JR. CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN HAND

Directed by Scott Oishi, M.D., FACS, the center provides specialized care for children with congenital and acquired hand and upper limb conditions.



CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN LIMB LENGTHENING AND RECONSTRUCTION

Co-directed by clinical director David A. Podeszwa, M.D., and research director Elizabeth W. Hubbard, M.D., the center focuses on improving the lives of patients with various limb deformities and leg length discrepancies.



CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN SPORTS MEDICINE

Led by Philip L. Wilson, M.D., the center provides comprehensive care for numerous conditions and sport-related injuries. Medical Director of Clinical Research Henry B. Ellis, M.D., leads clinical research efforts, including ongoing studies to improve the quality of care and uncover ways to prevent injuries.

Specialty Clinics

CEREBRAL PALSY CLINIC

The Cerebral Palsy Clinic is a multidisciplinary clinic for the management of cerebral palsy in children and adolescents. Physicians from Orthopedics, Neurology and Rehabilitation Medicine, Pediatric Developmental Disabilities and Psychology work together to offer outstanding care, which has garnered worldwide recognition for the program.

CLUBFOOT/COMPLEX FOOT CLINIC

For clubfoot, specialists treat newborns and infants using the Ponseti method or surgically if necessary. Surgeons also have extensive experience treating numerous other foot and ankle disorders, including congenital vertical talus, metatarsus adductus, toe deformities, tarsal coalitions, accessory navicular bones and more.

HAND & UPPER EXTREMITY CLINIC

The first pediatric orthopedic facility in the nation to employ full-time hand surgeons, Scottish Rite experts have vast experience in the treatment of many conditions, including arthrogryposis, cleft hand, hypoplastic thumb, Madelung deformity, pollicization, polydactyly, symbrachydactyly, syndactyly and more.

LIMB LENGTHENING & RECONSTRUCTION CLINIC

In 1992, Scottish Rite began its limb lengthening research program based on the Ilizarov treatment method developed by Gavril Ilizarov, M.D., in Russia. The multidisciplinary clinic, including clinicians and researchers, focuses on improving the lives of patients with various limb deformities and leg length discrepancies. Driven by the goal of making the lengthening process easier for the patient, researchers have modified Ilizarov's technique to develop the TRUE/LOK™ External Fixation System, which includes the TRUE/LOK™ HEX and TRUE/LOK™ Trauma systems.

ORTHOTICS & PROSTHETICS

The Orthotics & Prosthetics clinic provides custom-made orthoses and prostheses for patients with special orthopedic needs. Orthotists and prosthetists provide comprehensive care through consultations, measuring, casting and molding, fitting, alignment, fabrication and follow-up visits at the Dallas and Frisco campuses.

PERTHES & COMPLEX HIP CLINIC

Scottish Rite pediatric orthopedic surgeons and researchers are at the forefront of treating and advancing treatments for patients with complex hip disorders, including Legg-Calvé-Perthes disease. Scottish Rite is the leading center for the International Perthes Study Group, a multicenter prospective cohort study that aims to better understand and treat patients with Perthes disease.

SCOLIOSIS & COMPLEX SPINE CLINIC

The world-class spine team cares for patients with adolescent idiopathic scoliosis, congenital scoliosis, early-onset scoliosis and neuromuscular and syndromic scoliosis. An EOS imaging system allows for long length images of the spine to be captured with significantly less radiation. Experts offer observation, bracing, surgery, casting and physical therapy methods. When necessary, complex treatment options include spinal fusion surgery, vertebral body tethering, growing rods and halo-gravity traction.

SPINA BIFIDA CLINIC

The Spina Bifida Clinic provides coordinated care to help each family and child navigate a successful life. The clinic offers an interdisciplinary team of experts from Pediatric Developmental Disabilities, Neurosurgery, Urology, Orthopedics, Physical and Occupational Therapy, and more to treat each child's individual needs.

CRAYON CLINIC IN DALLAS | FRACTURE CLINIC IN FRISCO

The Crayon Clinic in Dallas and the Fracture Clinic in Frisco specialize in same-day and next-day treatment for orthopedic fractures, musculoskeletal injuries and more. In Frisco, walk-in hours are offered for confirmed fractures.



Research

Research is the driving engine of the pediatric orthopedic knowledge base. With numerous large historical registries containing more than 30 years of data, Scottish Rite researchers conduct groundbreaking studies in basic, applied and clinical research. Alongside a multidisciplinary team of experts, fellows gain unparalleled opportunities in their research endeavors.

Sarah M. and Charles E. Seay Center for Musculoskeletal Research

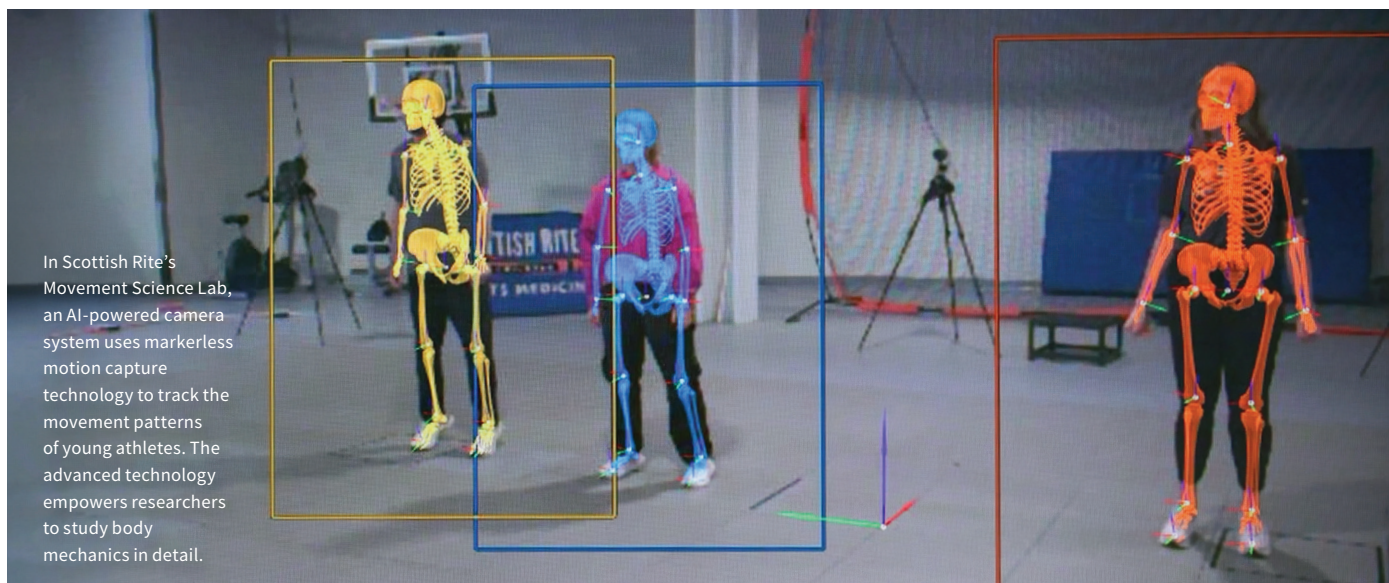
The Sarah M. and Charles E. Seay Center for Musculoskeletal Research is an integral component of the orthopedic program at Scottish Rite for Children. It comprises several core divisions focused on basic science research and six centers for excellence specializing in research and patient care. The Research department encourages and supports collaboration between researchers and physicians, allowing the organization to make innovative discoveries that have a significant impact on the lives of children.

A major strength of the organization's research program is that ideas can be reviewed and approved quickly, allowing researchers to start working on a project almost immediately. The Research Advisory Panel reviews proposals every month. The center also provides a biostatistician to help fellows with project planning and statistical analysis of data so that each project has a defensible result. Bioengineers assist fellows with the design, modification and mechanical testing of devices.



Center for Pediatric Bone Biology and Translational Research

Led by Carol A. Wise, Ph.D., scientists in the Center for Pediatric Bone Biology and Translational Research work to discover the underlying causes of poorly understood musculoskeletal disorders in children, as well as to understand the fundamental steps that lead to disease. In parallel, researchers work with clinicians to translate this knowledge into new treatments and improved diagnoses. The center works in close partnership with UT Southwestern Medical Center and in collaboration with many investigators around the world.



Movement Science Laboratories

Scottish Rite operates a Movement Science Laboratory (MSL) in Dallas and in Frisco. Using 3D motion capture technology, the labs study gait patterns and body mechanics to support research and clinical care.

In Dallas, the MSL team uses leading-edge technology to evaluate and identify movement to help physicians make decisions about the best treatment options for their patients. Led by Medical Director of Movement Science Lane Wimberly, M.D., the lab's engineers and biomechanists work directly with physicians to provide detailed analyses of patients' ability to walk. This research compares patient outcomes following different surgical procedures, assesses a specific treatment across varying types of patients, defines improvements in patients' conditions following physical and

occupational therapy and evaluates the effectiveness of various orthoses and prosthetic limb components.

In Frisco, MSL research ranges from preventing sport-related injuries and conditions to identifying ways to safely return an athlete to sports after an injury or surgery. Led by Division Director of Movement Science Sophia Ulman, Ph.D., biomechanists and bioengineers quantify movement patterns and potential deficits in active children and teens using novel machine learning methods. Data from patients and healthy subjects is used to assess treatment outcomes and establish return-to-play criteria after various sport-related injuries, including concussions. This data is also used to address broader issues like reducing risk before an injury occurs based on the sport and population.

MOLECULAR GENETICS

Led by Jonathan J. Rios, Ph.D., the Molecular Genetics laboratory uses high throughput genomics, cell-based assays and transgenic animal models to define underlying disease mechanisms that will enlighten improved treatments.

TISSUE REPAIR AND REGENERATION

Led by Principal Investigator Harry Kim, M.D., M.S., the Tissue Repair and Regeneration lab is leading the development of new treatment strategies for femoral head osteonecrosis and Legg-Calvé-Perthes disease through basic and translational research.

PEDIATRIC MUSCULOSKELETAL INFECTION

Led by Principal Investigator Lawson A. Copley, M.D., researchers study the genomic and virulence factors that cause deep and severely debilitating musculoskeletal infections in children.

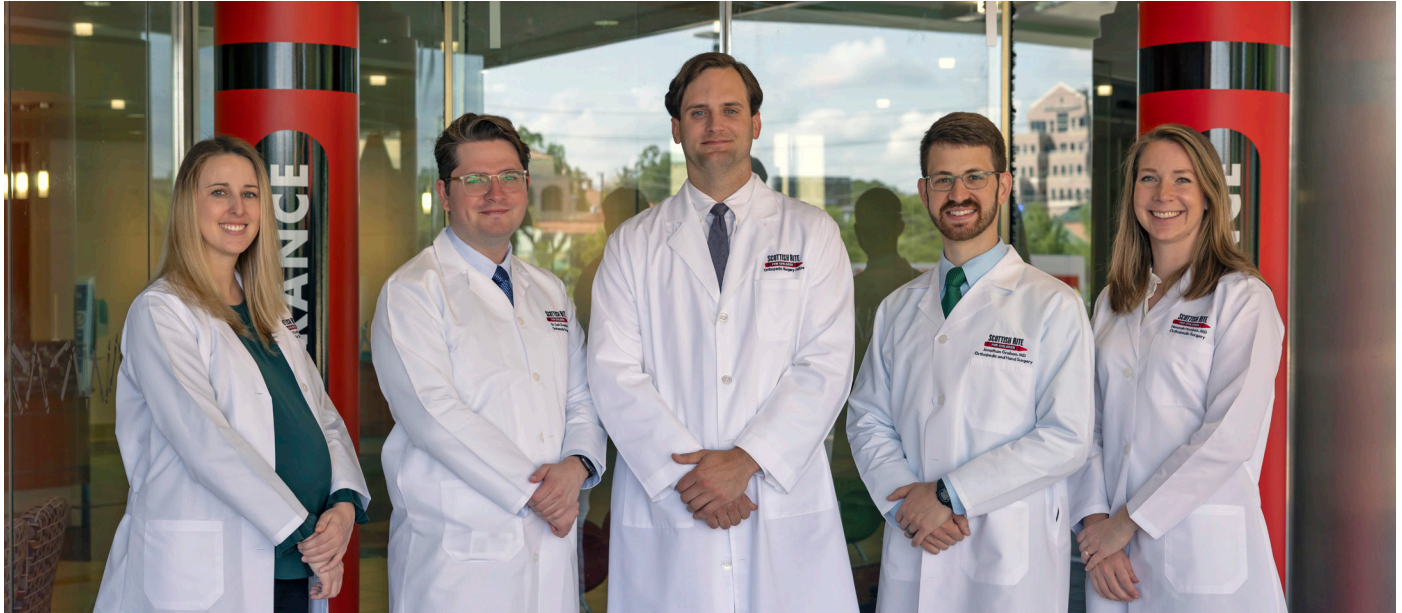

BENEFITS AND SALARY

- Fellows receive a stipend of **\$79,560** annually, payable biweekly.
- Up to **\$2,500** reimbursement for moving expenses.
- **Health and dental benefits** for fellows and their family at no cost to the fellow.
- **Group term life insurance** on the life of the fellow during the term of the fellowship at no cost to the fellow. Life insurance coverage includes an accidental death and dismemberment supplement.
